Shaped by Saint Joseph's Oratory

Gloria Lesser's emotion is palpable as she recalls her special connection with Saint Joseph's Oratory since 1941, and why she is a proud donor supporting the shrine. She has a warm attachment to the Oratory overlooking part of the mountain and to the interior decors that she and her brother Michael had walked through since childhood. "Rachel — our nanny — introduced us to the signs, symbols and rituals of Catholicism, such as the sign of the cross, the kneelers and kneeling steps of the Oratory's stairways, and the sculptural array of crutches on display in the Votive Chapel, decorated with bas reliefs by the sculptor Joseph Guardo."

A beacon of spirituality

For Gloria, "the Côte-des-Neiges borough remains a beacon of spirituality personified by the Oratory. Touched by the piety of the site, visitors from many cultural communities consider it a pilgrimage destination." She herself is particularly sensitive to this, having grown up in a Jewish family during the post-war period.

An artistic heritage

A Concordia University graduate in art history and having taught the subject at Champlain College in Saint-Lambert, Gloria eloquently expresses how the Oratory's architectural composition and the works of art on display awakened her on a profound level to the "spiritual dimension," particularly in relation to the religious icons of the Latin and Eastern rites on which she still focuses her research, and her intellectual and spiritual curiosity. Her passion for art history found its reflection in her generosity.

She has contributed to the enrichment of the artistic landscape of Saint Joseph's Oratory, in particular through her gift to the Oratory Museum of religious ceramics made by Quebec ceramists and enamellers.

A place of refuge

With quiet simplicity, she describes how in all the difficult and challenging moments of her life, such as her brother's death, Saint Joseph's Oratory served as a place of refuge and steadiness for her.

Gloria's story also reveals how the Oratory has, in turn, nourished her and given back to her in kind, shaping her interior and spiritual landscape.

Whether it is through an annual or monthly gift, a donation dedicated to a specific project or activity, or a bequest for the Oratory in a will, your commitment ensures the continuation of our pastoral care—masses, sacrament of reconciliation, blessings, guidance—and our ability to offer programs to pilgrims and visitors, such as welcoming students who are learning about Saint Brother André, accommodating the sick who come to pray to Brother André for healing and supporting immigrants who visit the Oratory to give thanks to Saint Joseph for the new life they are embarking upon.


Generation X (41-55)

On June 10, during a ceremony at the Basilica of the Oratory, Caroline Bourgeois, Executive Committee vicechair and responsible for large parks, Mount Royal, sports and recreation, Espace pour la vie, Jean-Drapeau Park and the East End of Montréal, and Peter A. Howlett, C.M., president of Les amis de la montagne, were pleased to award the Prix du Mont-Royal 2022 to Father Claude Grou, CSC, rector of Saint Joseph's Oratory of Mount Royal from 2005 to 2020.

As rector of the Oratory, Father Grou distinguished himself by his outstanding contribution to the protection and enhancement of the Westmount summit of the mountain. He also guided the planning and implementation of the Oratory's major development project. He is also a founding member of the Table de concertation du Mont-Royal.
