# THE CARILLON IS BACK IN FULL FORM

The carillon of Saint Joseph's Oratory is back home on Mount Royal after undergoing major restoration work by France's Paccard Foundry between 2019 and 2023. The 56 bells that were installed in 1955 have been cleaned, brushed and tuned, giving them back their original shine and proper tones.

Six new bells, including four cast by Paccard Foundry, were added as well, increasing the range of this distinguished instrument. In June, the bronze bells were blessed and then mounted in the new steel and glass bell tower overlooking what will soon be the new Reception Pavilion.

ndrée-Anne Doane has been looking forward to this day more than anyone else. As the titular carillonist, she closely monitored every step in the process of installing the restored bells. This has been a major event for the musician, who has been making the Oratory's bells sing since 2009. She knows each bell by name, note and how they harmonize with one another.

On September 5, 2018, for her final recital with the instrument before its restoration, she played "Je reviendrai à Montréal." The carillon delivered! It's now back in full form and with six new bells to boot, the largest of these—the bourdon—weighing 3,600 kg and delivering a beautiful B-flat. It's adorned with the likeness of Saint Brother André and honours the generosity of its benefactors.

"The restoration will enhance the carillon and allow people to fully appreciate its true value," says Andrée-Anne Doane, who is eager to master the new additions. "There will be more consistency across the keys. I won't have to press as hard to make the bigger bells ring!" She also highlights another significant improvement: "The place where I'll be playing is quieter, which will make it easier for me to hear each bell."

## A musical gift

Andrée-Anne Doane's azure eyes shine with her passion for the carillon and music. It is a gift that runs in the Doane family. Her parents are mezzo soprano Marie Laferrière and tenor David Doane, who sang far more than lullabies to their three children thanks to their rich, powerful voices. The parents exposed their children to the true artistry of music: "Passing down our love of music and our faith is important to our family."

A decade ago, Andrée-Anne Doane became a member of the Guild of Carillonneurs in North America. Last June, her son Gabriel became the first student from the Vincent d'Indy music school to earn a degree in carillons. The next generation of artists is here and the future looks bright for the carillon of the Oratory.



## THE PATH TO GOD

## AN EXCEPTIONAL MUSICAL HERITAGE

#### A SHINING CARILLON

The return of the Paccard carillon bells in June generated a great deal of media attention and, understandably, sparked curiosity among the public. The carillon was loaned to Saint Joseph's Oratory of Mount Royal for its Golden Jubilee celebrations in 1955, and it remained at the Oratory thanks to generous donors.

After major restoration work, the 56-bell carillon has returned from France bearing an additional six bells. Among those added, two of the larger bells increase the range available to the carillonists. The casting of these bells was made possible thanks to those who donated to the *Reaching New Heights* campaign. These bells are your bells. Their melodies will be your voice ringing out on the mountain.

#### A MAJESTIC ORGAN

The huge interior of the Basilica fills with the magnificent sounds of the grand organ Beckerath during celebrations and concerts. Created between 1958 and 1959, it is an impressive 5,811-pipe organ. Since its inaugural concert in November of 1960, famous organists have played on this incredible instrument.


